International Relations in the 21St Century: Existing and Emerging Issues

In a complex and changing world order, concerns about national and international security, world peace, multilateralism, regional integration, human rights, environment and sustainable development assume increased significance. We need new approaches, ideas, perspectives, policies and thoughts to keep pace with the dynamism of international systems and power equations. The discussion of existing and emerging issues demands particular attention. Certain issues have received necessary attention at the media and policy levels. These also need to be subjected to careful academic analysis and critical evaluation to make connections and draw logical inferences and conclusions. In this context, the KPS Menon Chair for Diplomatic Studies, School of International Reactions and Politics, Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam, Kerala, India is organising an International Online Lecture Series on the theme "International Relations in the 21st Century: Existing and Emerging Issues". The series of talks, scheduled to be held between 15 and 24 December 2020, will discuss and debate existing and emerging issues in contemporary international relations from multi-theoretical perspectives. The papers of the Online Lecture Series will be published in a book in honour of the founding pillars of SIRP, who worked tirelessly and contributed intellectually to establish the School of International Relations and Politics, Mahatma Gandhi University as a pioneering institute of Politics and International Relations.

School Of International Relations and Politics (SIRP)

The School of International Relations and Politics (SIRP) was established as one of the founding academic departments of the Mahatma Gandhi University, Kerala, India on 2 October 1983. It is one of the first and few institutions in the country to offer instruction and engage in research in areas like politics, international relations, human rights as well as public policy and governance. The teaching-learning process at SIRP is shaped by a view of higher education as a process of developing a critical faculty on questions of polity, culture, economy and international society so that the students will become involved learners. The School has also kept in perspective the developments that have taken place in the global political, economic, and strategic landscape.

The School places great emphasis on research in the frontier areas of political science, international relations and human rights. The research culture in the School promotes scholastic engagements in an interdisciplinary matrix. The School keeps in perspective the policy implications of social research and encourages such themes as are relevant to society at large. The priority areas are Indian diaspora studies, intellectual property rights, West Asian studies, cross-national communication in South Asia, trade, development and governance, strategic and security studies. It enjoys considerable freedom in carrying on independent research. Eminent scholars and diplomats regularly visit the School and offer special lectures on critical themes of international relations. The School publishes two international peer-reviewed academic journals: Indian Journal of Politics and International Relations and South Asian Journal of Diplomacy.

About the K.P.S. Menon Chair for Diplomatic Studies

The School of International Relations and Politics, Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam is privileged to have a Chair in honour of, and to perpetuate the memory of the late K.P.S. Menon Sr., a highly esteemed diplomat-extraordinary of this country. The Chair is a befitting tribute to this legendary diplomat whose contributions to the making of India's foreign policy are profound and enduring. The institution of the Chair in Mahatma Gandhi University has special significance. It was in Kottayam that the late K.P.S. Menon was born and had his early schooling. More importantly, it was in the centennial year of the late K.P.S. Menon (1998) that the School of International Relations and Politics of Mahatma Gandhi University proposed the plan of the Chair and the Academic Council approved it.

Dr. C.V. Cheriyan was a specialist in studies on the United States and East Asian affairs. He headed the School from its establishment to September 1989.

Dr. G.P Ramachandra joined the School in January 1988. An expert on South East Asia and political philosophy, he was Professor and Director and retired in March 2007.

Dr. K. N. Harilal, an economist, was on the faculty for almost a decade. He is currently Professor in the Centre for Development Studies, Trivandrum, and Member, Kerala State Planning Board, Government of Kerala.

 $\textbf{Dr. Haresamudram Srikanth,} \ a \ special ist in political theory as well as indigenous peoples, was on the faculty for a few years. Currently, he is Professor of Political Science, North-Eastern Hill University, Shillong.$

Dr. Raju K. Thadikkaran specialises in Russian and Chinese Studies as well as on IPR and technology transfer, joined the School in December 1984. He also officiated as the Chairman, Centre for IPR Studies, Honourary Director, Institute for Contemporary Chinese Studies and Honourary Director, University Centre for International Cooperation. He was also Director of the School for several years and retired in March 2016.

Dr. K. M. Seethi, an expert on IR Theory and South Asian Studies, joined the School in December 1984. He is currently the Director, Inter University Centre for Social Science Research and Extension, MG University. Dr Seethi served as the Director of the School for several years as well as Dean of Social Sciences, MG University. He also officiated as the Coordinator, K.P.S. Menon Chair for Diplomatic Studies and Honourary Director, KN Raj Study Centre. He retired in March 2020.

Dr. A.K. Ramakrishnan specialises on West Asia as well as gender issues, joined the School in December 1984. He held the Directorship for some time and also officiated as the Chairman, Centre for West Asian Studies. He is currently Professor of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi.

Dr. A.M. Thomas, a specialist on American studies and diaspora studies, has been on the faculty since January 1985. He was the Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Member of the Syndicate of the MG University. Dr Thomas also officiated as the Chairman, Centre for Indian Diaspora Studies and Coordinator, Nelson Mandela Chair for Afro Asian Studies. He also served as the Director of the School and will retire in 2021.
